

HOME. | WEEK 3 GROUP CONTENT

SERMON QUESTIONS:

Ice Breaker: If you could instantly master any skill, what would it be?

- 1. Joys and Challenges** – When you think about your role as a parent, grandparent, mentor, or spiritual parent, what part of that responsibility feels most joyful right now, and what part feels most overwhelming?
- 2. Faith Conversations** – Psalm 78:1–7 calls parents to “tell the next generation” ... so that children would put their trust in God—what are the most natural moments in your current rhythm of life where faith conversations could happen more intentionally?
- 3. Growing This Week** – Looking at the three skills from the sermon—opening your mouth, serving together, and modeling faith through marriage or relationships—which one do you sense God inviting you to grow in right now, and what would a small, faithful next step look like this week?
- 4. Trusting God** – The sermon reminded us that children ultimately belong to God and are entrusted to us for a season—how does that truth reshape the pressure you feel, the fears you carry, or the control you’re tempted to hold onto?
- 5. Supporting the Next Generation** – As a group, how can we support one another in being consistent spiritual leaders for the next generation, and who is one child or family you can intentionally pray for and invest in over the rest of this series?

“I Will” STATEMENT: An ‘I Will’ Statement is where we respond to what we discussed by making a simple commitment to an action we can complete in the next week. It is a deliberate commitment to practically obey the Word of God and listen to the Holy Spirit. Share what you feel like God may be calling you to do.

PRAYER: Take time to ask each person how the group can be praying for them during the next week. Take notes so you can follow up. If this is your first meeting, plan to be the one to pray out loud for the group. As the group continues, pay attention to everyone’s comfort level with praying out loud before inviting others to do so. No one should feel pressured, but should be encouraged.
